
HIGHLIGHTS

- Ninety-Six percent (96%) of passenger and cargo shipping operations were completed in accordance with the ships' CPC.
- Four percent (4%) of the shipping operations were affected.
- Operations of passenger ships were more affected compared to cargo ships. 100% of the cargo shipping operations were completed under normal conditions compared to passenger ships at 94%.
- With cargo shipping still operational, transport of goods is assured.

PASSENGER AND CARGO SHIPPING IN NUMBERS 7/31/2022



I. STATUS OF SHIPPING OPERATIONS NATIONWIDE



On 7/31/2022, there were 52 passenger and cargo shipping operations conducted wherein 50 or 96% were completed in accordance with their Certificate of Public Convenience (CPC).

Out of the 50 operations completed under normal conditions, the reported movements were mostly in the Eastern Visayas Region at 66% and CALABARZON Region at 18%.

Two (2) passenger ships or 6% encountered delays.

No shipping operations were not completed at the time of reporting.

Based on the above table , 20 out of 20 (100%) cargo ships still operated normally – are 1 container ships, 3 LCT ships, 16 Roro cargo ships.

Thirty (30) passenger ships completed their voyage – 23 conventional passenger ships, 4 RoPax ships and 3 fast craft ferry completed their operations but mostly only carried cargoes during their voyage.

Meanwhile out of the 32 passenger ships, 6% were affected by the measures adopted in view of COVID-19. These measures caused either the cancellation, delay, or uncompleted operations of 2 passenger ships.
