I beg you to seek lifelong learning. The diploma you have today is not an end; it's a permission to grow. Stay curious. Keep updating your skills. Go for trainings. Take certifications. Read industry magazines and maritime literatures. And if it is presented, pursue further education not merely for the sake of promotion, but for purpose.

As a Filipino entering the world at sea, you carry more than your own dreams; you carry our country's reputation with you. Today, over 25% of the world's seafarers are Filipinos. That is no accident. It is the result of our work ethics, our discipline, and our uncompromising commitment to excellence. You are an ambassador of a global force—the Filipino seafarers. And that means everything you do reflects back on all of us.

So be proud of that. Be proud of getting to work early for your watch. Be proud of keeping good work done. Be proud of delivering thorough and comprehensive reports, following safety protocols, and respecting your multicultural team. Let your integrity ring out even louder than your talent.

Of course, the journey will not be smooth. Loneliness at sea is no myth. Fatigue can make your head spin. You may be in touch with family and friends very little. You will miss birthdays, special occasions, and milestones. And yes, there would be moments that you would question, "Is it worth it?"

Graduates, in those times, revisit your "why." Why did you embark on this journey? Was it to better your family? To travel the world? To prove something to yourself? To be in an industry that connects global economies? Whatever your "why" is, hold on to it.

Remember also that asking for help is not weakness; it is wisdom. When you already onboard, speak up. Ask for guidance. Look out for your crewmates. And when you have the chance to look out for someone younger than you, do so. That is what will keep this company healthy— not just ships and steel, but people looking out for people.

On the part of the government, we at the MARINA are continuously improving our policies and systems in order to ensure the continued employment and welfare of our seafarers. When I assumed the post as MARINA Administrator, I laid down the 10-point agenda of the Agency which establishes the thrust of the agency under my leadership. Allow me to share with you today the priority programs of MARINA as you are all part of the maritime industry which we yearn to sustain and protect:

Digitalization of MARINA's Frontline Services, including the MARINA Integrated Seafarers Management Online (MISMO), specifically designed for seafarers, MHEIs and MTIs, even medical practitioners. You can get you documents/certificates from MARINA anytime, anywhere, as long as you have the internet connectivity.

It is MARINA's responsibilities and obligation to ensure sustained compliance with the requirements of the STCW Convention, as amended and its associated Code.

MARINA is also preparing for IMO Strategy on Greenhouse Gas Emissions, Maritime Autonomous Surface Ship (MASS), we are benchmarking on how other IMO Member States have introduce the necessary skills. With the passage of the Magna Carta of Filipino Seafarers, expect changes in the system and processes.

In closing, it would be remiss of me not to acknowledge the substantial support and guidance provided by your families, friends, educators, and mentors who have been steadfast companions on this odyssey. They have served as your pillars of strength and unwavering wellsprings of encouragement. Take a moment to express gratitude and acknowledge their indispensable role in your achievements.

To the parents, guardians, and families in attendance today—thank you. Thank you for your sacrifices, your prayers, and your patience. Behind every successful graduate, there is a village of quiet champions. This day is yours, too.

To the JBLCF-Bacolod officials, faculty, mentors, and staff—you have done more than impart skills; you have shaped lives. Your reach goes far beyond the classroom. Thank you for your unwavering commitment to maritime greatness. To the graduates: whatever lies ahead: storms, victories, defeats; confront them with courage. You have it within you. You were not trained just for a job, but for a calling.
